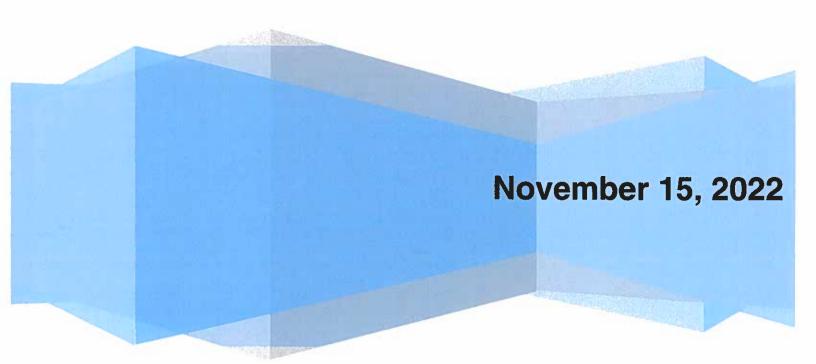

The Aging Disability Resource Center, also known as the Alamo Service Connection, is a call center where information and referrals are provided to seniors, people with disabilities, veterans and their families. The ASC helps navigate the complex system of services offered by government, nonprofit, and other service entities.

In 2022, four of the six performance measures were achieved for Bexar Area Agency on Aging. The goal set for congregate meals was not achieved as the largest congregate meal site provider in Bexar County (The City of San Antonio) did not re-open congregate meal sites until Feb. 28, 2022 (4 months into the fiscal year). From Oct. thru Feb. 28 only grab-and-go meals were offered. The delay in re-opening was impacted by the ongoing COVID-19 crisis.

One way trips also fell short as the goal was severely affected by staff and driver turnover.
