The performance projections planned for legal assistance and one-way trips in 2024 did not come to fruition. The amounts proposed did not account for the impact of fewer service requests, lawyer shortages, and less funding to address transportation needs. The AAA has since expanded their network of lawyers and have aligned transportation planning with funding strategies to ensure community demands are effectively met.

In 2024, Alamo Regional Transit converted to the statewide standard of reporting. The program began using revenue miles and hours as a measure of productivity. This new standard of reporting was issued by the Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT) Public Transportation Division (PTN).

2025 will be the year that Alamo Regional Transit will be recovered from the COVID era. ART will focus on stabilizing service to match funding.

Staff time was shifted to focus on individualized outreach and education for member governments regarding community and economic development issues specific to their location. While member governments were interested in broadband grant funding, the funding opportunities were primarily for service providers. More funding opportunities will be available in 2025 and targeted to communities.
